1:15 – 2:15	<b>Abuse of People with Dementia</b> Dr. Laura Mosqueda, Professor, University of Southern California and Director, National Center on Elder Abuse  People with dementia are mistreated at alarming rates. While some of the abuse is perpetrated with evil intent, much of it occurs at the hands (or voices) of caregivers who are overwhelmed, under supported, and/or not competent. In this session, Dr. Mosqueda will review the types and stages of dementia, describe how they correlate with abuse and neglect, and explore what we can do to prevent and stop mistreatment.
