Advocates hired by the Elder Abuse Institute of Maine work with older clients referred to them by Maine's Adult Protective Service (APS) workers. RISE also is currently being expanded to other states, issues, and systems. Our panel will briefly discuss how RISE was brought to life and its core methodologies. We will also discuss research documenting the RISE experience from a client's point of view, from the point of view of APS workers. We will also present research examining the specific methods used, and research showing RISE's impact on repeat case referrals to APS. The final portion of our discussion will be devoted to discussing RISESuP, our new project examining the role of substance use issues in victims, harmers and how we provide services.

2:25-3:25	<b>The Partnership Between Law Enforcement and Behavioral Health Specialists</b> Elsie-Kay Banks, Behavioral Health Coordinator, Maine State Police Jeni Moody, LSW, Maine State Police  This session will discuss the ways that Behavioral Health Coordinators embedded to a law enforcement agency can improve community relations, decrease repeat calls, and provide vital interim services by addressing major areas of concern such as: mental illness, substance abuse, housing, concerns of the aging and older people, and domestic violence.
3:25-3:45	<b>Elder Justice Roadmap Update</b> Jaye Martin, Executive Director, Legal Services for the Elderly  This presentation will provide an update on the progress being made in implementing Maine's Elder Justice Roadmap. The Roadmap was developed by the Elder Justice Coordinating Partnership. It identifies strategic priorities in the areas of direct victim services, public and professional education, public policy and data collection. The goal of the Roadmap is to decrease the incidence of elder abuse, increase the number of victims who seek and receive help, and improve the multidisciplinary response to elder abuse.
